Events & Activities

Tidings

1. Jack Dorsey Steps down as [Twitter](#) CEO, Parag Agrawal, an Indian American was unanimously appointed the new CEO by twitter's board.
2. Blood groups A, B & Rh+ are more at-risk of COVID, says the study at Delhi's Sir Ganga Ram Hospital. While those with blood groups O, AB and Rh- run a much lesser risk of infection.
3. Admiral R Hari Kumar on 29th November, 2021 assumed charge as the 25th Chief of the Naval Staff.
4. **Barbados**, the island nation becomes world's newest Republic on 28th November, 2021 nearly 400 years after the first English ships arrived at the Caribbean island.
5. Schools in Mumbai to remain shut till December 15, 2021 amid concerns over **Omicron** variant. The variant was first detected in South Africa. It has been declared as a "variant of concern" by WHO.
6. Governor of Assam & Nagaland Prof. Mukhi launched the "Eduversity Cares2" in Kohima on 30th November 2021. This becomes the first Civil Service Institution in the country to come up with such Support initiative for ladies.
7. National Commission for Women has set up a dedicated round clock (24x7) helpline number **7827170170** for women.
8. After a yearlong protest by the farmers the parliament approved repeal of farm laws with voice vote on 29th November 2021.
9. Nagaland Pre-service Teacher's Association (ANPSTA) on 30th Nov, 2021 has expressed surprise over Chief Minister Neiphiu Rio and School education adviser KT Sukhalu's statements in NLA regarding excess teachers. Citing reliable sources that annually around 250 teachers retired, ANPSTA wondered how the question of excess teachers arose and requested the government to share in public domain the basis of the information.
10. Nagaland University declared 2021 B.Ed result on 4th November, 2021 and MITE produced 14 State toppers out of 20, from 2019-2021 batch.

Nagaland's DGP John Longkumer and Commissioner Rovilatuo Mor said that an elite force had apparently fired at the coal miners without any attempt for identification.


